# **Independent Reading Lists for Fiction**

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#### Introduction

Research has shown independent reading to be hugely beneficial for young people, both academically and socially. It's brain food and it's also soul food.

What's more – there is no need for an expensive, magical formula to improve children's reading. The most reliable guide to how much they will improve is how much they read. This makes getting children and teenagers into a regular reading habit vital for their confidence and progress. This is never truer than during the holidays when homework is off the menu.

#### But what should they read?

The simplest and probably best answer is whatever they enjoy. We're blessed at Elizabeth College with a wonderful library and fantastic librarian in Mrs Garnett who regularly matches pupils with just the right book to stimulate them and take them that little bit further in their reading. Some pupils find their fascination is in the world of non-fiction; others get fired up by graphic novels. As Head of English, my area of expertise is with fiction so this is the focus of my first foray into offering some lists which might help parents and pupils in choosing new books when they are out of school. Hopefully, some of these selections are page turners which will have that 'unputdownable' quality the more reluctant reader needs; others have been chosen for the challenge and thought-provoking content they offer.

There are pros and cons to lists. It's true that nothing quite beats the warmth of a word-ofmouth recommendation. And lists are often as notable for what they omit and as what they remember to include. If you're looking for a more complete guide for choosing titles, I strongly recommend <u>The Ultimate Teen Book Guide</u> which offers over 750 suggestions rather than the 75 or so in this provisional list so far. But I still hope that what follows here may be helpful to you and your children in starting conversations about reading at home.

I've read most of the books that the English team have placed on this list: the other choices have come from conversations with enthusiastic pupils and teachers at this school. In this way, this provisional list is intended as a beginning rather than an ending. What unmissable novels have I left out? Which novels are overrated or even unsuitable? I'd love this list to keep evolving in the coming years to fully represent the College community's vibrant reading.

I wish you and your children a relaxing and stimulating holiday. If you would like any further advice or have feedback/suggestions to offer, I'd be delighted to hear from you.

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### How to use this guide

The books are arranged in alphabetical order of their authors in the three sections:

- Year 7 and above
- Year 10 and above
- Year 12 and above (forthcoming)

It's important to point out that these categories are just for guidance. While many of the selections in the first category have been written with younger readers in mind, quite a few have not. There is every chance that a pupil in Year 10 or higher will find a book which really appeals here; equally, ambitious younger readers should not feel that they can't try the books in the higher categories. It really depends on where pupils are in their reading and what they find most enjoyable. Evidently, books in the higher categories are likely to contain more mature material as well as being written in a more sophisticated style.

**Choosing a book:** The blurb accompanying the titles should give a first sense of whether the book is likely to appeal. My best advice would be to go to one of the larger book websites, find out more and try a sample of the book to get a sense of whether it is appealing and of the right level. This is one case where devices such as the Kindle can be useful as they allow this to be done for free on a dedicated reading platform.



You can read the openings of many books on the major websites such as Amazon or download samples. Even better, pop into your local bookshop or library and sample some of the shelves... the online Borrow Box service at Guille-Alles is brilliant too!



It's worth bearing in mind that some books are 'slow burn' pleasures so do try to give the author some time to 'hook' you in...

**Keeping reading going:** Holidays are a great time to read – they are the time when school lets us off the hook from homework! This is not the place to go into a long advice column on reading habits, but there are a few principles which may help:

**1. Make time and space for reading.** Make sure that bedrooms don't have an array of distractions in them; if they do, set a curfew for their use.

**2. Read for short periods.** Whether at the bus stop or waiting to be picked up from an activity, these short periods will keep reading happening and keep up interest.

**3. Share your reading.** Reading is an individual act but it should be a social activity. Talk about your books together!

PHILIP REEVE MORTAL ENGINES	<u>Mortal Engines</u> Philip Reeve Sci Fi Series (4) 300 pages, 2001	Philip Reeve's premise of cities on wheels is a brilliantly humorous one. But it also becomes convincing and compelling in this fantastically written series. There are twists and turns a plenty to come but Reeve's characters are also a real highlight, including the plucky Hester Shaw.
RICK RIORDAN	<u>Percy Jackson and the</u> <u>Lightning Thief</u> Rick Riordan Adventure / Fantasy Series (5) 400 pages, 2005	Percy Jackson's exploits have turned into the stuff of blockbuster cinema and it's easy to see why Riordan's novels mix modern teen attitude with the mythological greats of the Greek pantheon.
